President's Report

The SCA Committee held its first meeting of the year in January on Australia Day weekend at the Koala Centre. It was agreed the key SCA campaign for 2018 - 2020 be Silverleaves Conservation Association Against Inappropriate Development (SCAAID). The focus is on efforts to prevent any further removal of native vegetation in Silverleaves and to protect the area from overdevelopment. By that we mean buildings that don't fit the gentle beach house style neighbourhood character that the area is known for, that are too high (over 7 metres), too large in mass, and involve all or most of the vegetation.

We are working with the Small Towns Coastal Alliance joining with other 'villages' of Bass Coast Shire to lobby Council for these additional protections.

As part of SCAAID, our group has publicised recent examples of inappropriate vegetation removal in Silverleaves in the local paper. Three prominent stories have been published about these incidents and include some excellent commentary from Councillor Michael Whelan. We are grateful that Councillor Whelan has come out strongly, opposing the native vegetation and wholesale block clearing in Phillip Island and San Remo Advertiser (PISRA). While this is encouraging, we will continue to monitor development proposals and liaise with Council, having pointed out that if everyone was able to clear their block, Silverleaves would cease to exist!

A very good editorial in PISRA published in January highlighted the protection being proposed by the Victorian State Government for what it has identified to be unique areas and towns including Mt Macedon and the Otway Ranges. We are hoping Silverleaves can be included as it was disappointing none of the towns or locations in Bass Coast Shire of significance have been identified.

No Unleashed Dogs

This summer has arguably been the worst ever for uncontrolled dogs on Silverleaves beach. By that we mean dogs on the beach outside the designated times and off leash dogs anytime.

A respectful reminder:

- No off-leash dogs on Silverleaves beach at any time, all year around.
- No dogs allowed on the beach between 10.00am and 5.00pm and 8.00pm and 7.00am from 1 December to 30 April.
- No dogs are allowed beyond the last track at the east end of Silverleaves Beach to Observation Point at any time of the year.

Disappointingly, both visitors and locals continue to flout these rules at Silverleaves. One of our Committee members, who walks into Cowes along the beach each morning in Summer, reported seeing over 20 dogs on the beach after 10.00am both on and off leash every day.

Why is this an issue for the environment?

- Dogs are a threat to the fragile hooded plover communities and other seabirds on Silverleaves beach which nest and lay their eggs in Summer in the dunes. One dog is all it takes to destroy a nest.
- Dogs can pollute the beach – please make sure you take plastic bags with you and pick up after your dog.

We ask everyone to please help protect this unique area.

Silverleaves January Nature Walk 2018

The SCA's wonderful annual beach nature walk at Silverleaves was held in beautiful weather on January 14 this year, and enjoyed by all in attendance. Organised by Jarvis Weston, SCA Secretary and Phillip Island Nature Park Projects Coordinator, and Daniel Lees, PINP Ranger. Daniel's specialist field is the nesting shorebirds. We have the Hooded Plovers, Red Capped Plovers and Pied Oyster Catchers along the Silverleaves beach and to the Point. Daniel also organises the Hooded Plover Watch Program Island-wide where volunteers are rostered on to help educate and advise beach walkers about the nesting birds in the vicinity and to keep clear of the fenced off areas on the beaches. A big thank you to Jarvis and Daniel for their time and expertise.

Proposed Car Ferry at Cowes is back on the agenda

One of our few beautiful North facing Victorian beaches maybe destroyed by the addition of the Stony Point to Phillip Island car ferry. The council is currently in discussions to locate the terminal at or near the Cowes Yacht Club which will destroy the beach, and have a huge impact upon the locals and tourists who use this beach - swimmers, power boaters, sailors, kayakers and all water users! This development could also have an impact on Silverleaves beach with possible dredging and change to tidal currents which could cause further erosion to the foreshore.

This pristine Cowes beach will be cut in half by the proposed ferry terminal which comes with a 400m exclusion zone (200m either side of jetty) making a large area of this family friendly, safe swimming beach unusable! The proposed terminal is right in the middle of a quiet residential area adding traffic to an area where children ride bikes and walk.

Hooded Plovers

Sadly, this year there has been only one hooded Plovers nest at Silverleaves which failed to produce any chicks, but it has been a successful season so far on the Island overall with 38 nests, 15 of which have hatched producing 39 chicks, with one still active nest.

Currently there are 8 active chicks, and so far, 8 chicks have successfully fledged. These fledglings have come from: Smith's beach (1), Elizabeth Cove (2), Hutchison beach (1), Flynn's beach (2) and Woolshed Bight (2).

The active chicks are at: Red-rocks (1 left), Belavista Rd (1 left), Forrest Caves (3), Cleeland Bight (1 left) and Farm beach (2).

We also have 23 pairs breeding on the Island, the greatest number recorded to date! This due in part to the great efforts of the Hooded Plovers Watch Program island-wide, where volunteers are rostered on to help educate and advise beach walkers about the nesting birds in the vicinity and to keep clear of the fenced off areas on the beaches.

Silverleaves Boundaries

A SCA member recently inquired about the boundaries of the Silverleaves area. Silverleaves area is bordered by:

- Coghlan Rd (in the west)
- Settlement Rd (to the south)
- Bordered by the bay and Rhyll Inlet

Coastal management

Bass Coast Shire manages the coastline up to the east end of Silverleaves Avenue, and Phillip Island Nature Park manages from there including Observation Point and Rhyll Inlet.

Silverleaves Birdlife

It's a busy time for the bird life with the Banksias coming into flower at the moment. Wattle birds and Rainbow Lorikeets in particular are attracted to the nectar and you often can hear them, especially at dawn with the cacophony of noisy squawkings - a lovely way to wake up unless you were planning a sleep in!

The Rainbow Lorikeet is unmistakable with its bright red beak and colourful plumage. Both sexes look alike, with a blue (mauve) head and belly, green wings, tail and back, and an orange/yellow breast. They are often seen in loud and fast-moving flocks, or in communal roosts at dusk and dawn.

Sticky Weed

Cleavers (*Gallium aparine*) is regarded as an environmental weed in Victoria, Tasmania and New South Wales. This is an annual, sprawling weed that has small hooks along the stems, at the tip and along the edges of the leaves and on the fruit. These hooks will catch (cleave) onto clothes, fur and feathers helping this plant to spread to new locations.

If you see this weed or have it on your property, pull it out carefully and dispose of in the Organics (green lid) bin.

Planting in your garden in Silverleaves

The coming months are ideal to start planting in your garden, here are a few ideas of what grows well in Silverleaves:

Low Shrubs (up to 2 m)

Coastal Saltbush- *Atriplex Cinereal*
White Correa- *Correa Alba*
Cushion Bush- *Leacopogon Brownii*

Tall Shrubs 2-5 m

Coastal Wattle- *Acacia Sophorae*
Sweet Bursaria- *Bursaria Spinose*
Coast Tea Tree- *Leptospermum Laevigatum*

Grasses/Sedges

Knobby Club-sedge- *Ficina Nodose*
Spiny Headed Mat-rush- *Lomandra Longifolia*
